NWEE has provided \$8.5million funding since 1998 to Ngati Whakaue students undertaking tertiary study. In recent years this support has been enhanced by a JV entered into with Te Herenga Waka/Victoria University to support students undertaking study at Victoria University.

This year, Maori Education Trust have further increased that support by way of tripartite arrangements with Te Herenga Waka and with Massey University along with a joint venture with NWEE to support all other NW students through our tertiary scheme. Our students are very grateful for this additional support which has resulted in quite substantial funding to assist with their increased costs. Current position: Doctoral candidate

Summary: I am a Doctoral candidate at the University of Waikato based in Tauranga. I graduated with my Master of Science (Research) with first class honors in October of 2021, with that research focusing on the national exposure of coastal marae to the impacts of sea level rise with climate change. My doctoral thesis focuses on codeveloping a decolonized managed retreat strategy for Aotearoa New Zealand, specifically pertaining to marae, hapū and iwi where relocation is deemed the most appropriate climate adaptation strategy. This year I received a Ngāti Whakaue Education Endowment Trust Scholarship. This scholarship has been integral to my studies. It has enabled me to commit to my research, without the burden of financial stress. I have been able to build a solid foundation for my career, and this support has enabled me to conduct my doctoral research, providing much needed information for our people to adapt to the future impacts of climate change.

I began my studies by completing a Bachelor of Science in physiology. But realised my passion was in psychology so changed my major to that for my Bachelor of Science Honours. I was then accepted into the Doctor of Clinical Psychology programme. 2023 will be my final year and I will be an intern working in the Māori addiction and mental health field as well as finishing my thesis. My thesis is titled - Kaumātuatanga o Te Roro: A Māori approach to the assessment and management of mate wareware (dementia). The overall aim of this research is to improve existing approaches to the assessment and management of dementia in Māori. The objectives of the proposed research are to: (1) contribute to a kaupapa Māori theory about dementia, and (2) use this knowledge to develop a Māori-responsive assessment tool for the diagnosis of dementia. The tool is called The Māori Assessment of neuropsychological Abilities, (MANA Tool).

While not studying I enjoy playing hockey and have been selected in the New Zealand Māori Hockey Tāne side for the last since 2016.

Gaining this scholarship has enabled me to focus on my studies and not have the additional pressures related to finances.

I am driven by who I am as ‘he wahine Māori.’ I offer a passion for education and have had a range of roles in school across Rotorua for the last 36 years. I have taught at both primary and secondary levels and in kura kaupapa, mainstream and catholic settings. I have just completed my first year of my Doctoral studies in Māori and Indigenous Studies through the University of Canterbury and will resume my role as Deputy Principal next year. My own parents were kaiako - Mita and Hukarere Mohi. They have provided their own worlds of learning that have also shaped the learner that I am and the depth and breadth of learning that is also through traditional and non-traditional pathways.

I am grateful for the opportunity to support the growth of a legacy that is uniquely Ngāti Whakaue and acknowledge the role models who surround me - ‘e kore aku mihi e mimiti ana...’

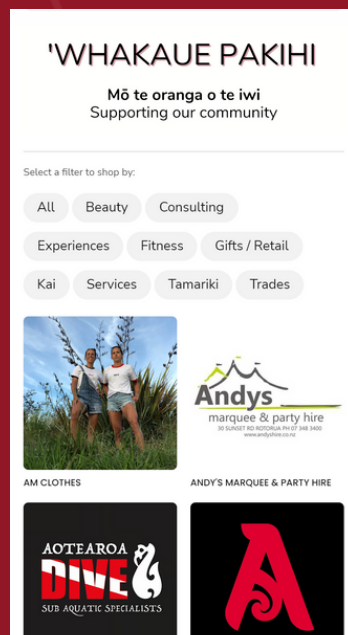
